



Chinese New Year

Chinese New Year, also known as Lunar New Year or Spring Festival, is the most important festival in China. In 2022 it falls on February 1st, beginning the year of the Tiger.

The holiday celebrates looking to the future for new beginnings, with themes of happiness, health, and good fortune. Traditionally, it was a time to honor deities as well as ancestors, and it has also become a time to feast and to visit family members.

The celebrations last about two weeks in total, from Chinese New Year's Eve to the Lantern Festival, which is held on the 15th day of the lunar year. Here are some ideas for celebrating Chinese New Year!

Sweep out bad luck

Traditionally, for a fresh start to Chinese New Year, houses are cleaned to symbolise sweeping away the bad luck of the previous year and welcome in good luck for this year.

Decorate with red and gold

After cleaning, houses decorated with lanterns and banners red and gold, which are considered lucky colours. In addition, the lanterns and banners contain messages of fortune, happiness, wealth, and longevity.

A Reunion Dinner

Chinese New Year starts with a Reunion Dinner among family members and this dinner is one of the most important meals of the year. Enjoy a Reunion Dinner with your loved ones to eat some traditional Chinese New Year cuisine. Some traditional dishes are chicken, dumplings, spring rolls, fish for prosperity, longevity noodles for happiness, and tangerines for good luck.

Wear Red

In Chinese culture, red symbolises good energy, wealth, happiness, and protection. During Chinese New Year, try to wear as much red as possible.

Red Envelopes

Red envelopes with money are traditionally handed to the younger members of the family by the senior members of the family. This is sure to be popular with the grandchildren!

Fireworks salt painting

Fireworks are often set off to celebrate Chinese New Year. Try making temporary firework salt paintings by drawing glue on black paper, sprinkling salt over the glue, then dabbing on some watercolour paints with a brush. The colours will blend and swirl together to create a beautiful effect.

Running low on bread but don't want to go to the supermarket? Want to make a pizza and need a base? Feel like wraps for lunch?

If you know how to make homemade flatbread, you'll never buy supermarket tortilla wraps again as these versatile flatbreads taste so much better, especially when they are freshly made. Plus, they are much cheaper and so easy to make with basic ingredients found in most kitchens. They are delicious plain, and you can also add optional flavourings such as garlic or herbs by mixing into the dough.

Ingredients

3 cups plain flour or self-raising flour

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon baking powder (omit if using self-raising flour)

1/3 cup canola oil

1 cup warm water

Method

Mix the dry ingredients together then add the oil and mix until it looks like fine breadcrumbs. Add the warm water a bit at a time until you can make a soft dough. Add a bit more flour if it is too sticky. Kneed for a few minutes, then leave it to rest for half an hour or so in a covered bowl.

Break into sections (this amount of dough would make about 8 tortillas or 2-3 pizzas), and roll out on benchtop as flat as you can.


To make Tortillas or Naan: Heat a non-stick pan on the stovetop to a bit under ³/₄ heat (will depend on your stove) and cook without any oil for about 30 seconds or so, then flip over and do the other side for 15-30 seconds or so. It will puff up while it's cooking. These cook very fast, so keep a close eye on them.

To use as pizza base: put toppings on the uncooked base and bake in the oven, switching to the grill for the last couple of minutes or so.

You can also use this recipe with sweet toppings in place of pancakes.





Each year, in honor of Valentine's Day, the Secretaries of Juliet award one letter the "Cara Giulietta" (Dear Juliet) prize for the most beautiful letter.

Why not treat yourself or your loved one to these lovely strawberry cupcakes on Valentine's Day? This recipe makes 12 cupcakes that are sure to please!

Cupcake ingredients

175g self-raising flour
115g caster sugar
2 eggs
100g Greek yogurt
115g butter, melted and cooled slightly
100g strawberries, hulled and finely
chopped

Icing ingredients

300g icing sugar, sifted
150g butter, softened
2tbsp milk
1tsp vanilla extract
6 large strawberries, halved, or 12 small whole strawberries
Heart-shaped sprinkles (optional)

Method

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan and line a 12-hole muffin tin with cupcake cases.

Mix the flour and sugar together in a large bowl. Whisk together the eggs, yogurt and melted butter in another bowl. Gradually mix the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients until you have a smooth batter, then fold in the strawberries.


Fill the prepared cases with batter so they are about three-fourths full. Bake for 25-30 mins, or until golden and a skewer inserted into the middle of each cupcake comes out clean. Leave to cool.

While the cupcakes are cooking, make the icing. Beat the sugar and butter together until smooth and pale, then add the milk and vanilla and beat until the icing is evenly mixed.

Spoon the icing into a piping bag fitted with a star nozzle, then pipe in swirls onto the cupcakes when they are cooled. Decorate each with a strawberry half or small strawberry. If you want to go further with the Valentine's Day theme, you can also add heart-shaped sprinkles to the icing.




